Top 8 Skills Students Need

(& How to Develop Them)

Do the students you work with have the skills and confidence to act in ways that reveal rooted character? Do they have exactly what the world needs?

Pair these skill-building strategies with the <u>Leader in Me Curriculum</u> to grow more—and better—leadership across your campus.



Personal Effectiveness

1) RESPONSIBILITY

Taking accountability for actions.

- Equip students with tools for <u>emotion</u> <u>regulation</u> and <u>self-awareness</u>.
- Cultivate initiative by entrusting students with <u>classroom</u> <u>leadership roles</u>.



2) VISION

Imagining a meaningful future outcome and creating a plan to get there.

- Support students in **clarifying values** by crafting personal and team mission statements.
- Leverage <u>learning targets</u> and <u>Leadership</u>
 <u>Portfolios</u> to model and scaffold **planning ahead** and **goal setting**.

3) PRIORITIZATION

Ranking tasks in order of importance based on goals and values.

- Model time management with the <u>Daily Routine</u> Planning Tool and <u>Weekly Planning Template</u>.
- Coach discipline with the <u>Transitions Toolkit</u> and Big Rocks Tracker.
- Use direct lessons about <u>resilience</u> to help students develop adaptability.

4) HIGHER-ORDER THINKING

Evaluating information, generating creative ideas, solving complex problems, and leading one's learning.

- Promote critical thinking and problem solving by weaving the 7 Habits[®] into various contentarea lessons.
- Model and teach metacognition.



Interpersonal Effectiveness

5) RELATIONSHIP-BUILDING

Using consistent interactions to build trust and balancing one's personal needs with the needs of others.

- Build **trust** and help students balance **courage with consideration** by establishing Emotional Bank Account Systems.
- Use Shout-Out Cards to encourage an abundance mindset.

6) COMMUNICATION

Reaching mutual understanding through the clear exchange of information.

- Create daily opportunities to practice listening with morning meetings.
- Explicitly teach <u>"I" Messages</u> and <u>academic discourse</u> to prompt verbal expression.
- Incorporate opportunities for students to reflect on and practice non-verbal communication with daily greetings and hand signals.

7) EMPATHY

Understanding and respecting another person's thoughts and feelings with the intent to see their perspective.

- Cultivate humility with a supportive social-emotional environment.
- Use inclusive school culture resources to promote respect and understanding.

8) COLLABORATION

Working together in a way that draws on everyone's unique strengths and ideas in order to find the best solution.

- Encourage creative
 cooperation and valuing
 differences by taking a team
 approach to leadership roles
 and celebrating with Synergy
 Awards.
- Use <u>Leadership & Quality Tools</u> to capture group thinking, build consensus, and **resolve** conflicts.
